Hatching Chickens...

The past couple of weeks Māhuri has been looking after ten chicks for laying eggs for the new chicken coop.

The eggs have gone through an incubator, hatched and are now under a heat blanket. An incubator is a device for simulating a mother sitting on her eggs by heating and rotating the eggs. After three days they go into a small pen with a heat blanket, that is like a small roof that keeps heating up so the chicks are able to go under it to get warm if need be. When we got them we learnt that they don't see each other as siblings. So not too soon they will start the pecking order. That is when they start pecking each other to see who is the strongest or the weakest. We still don't know which is a hen or rooster yet. We need three hens to lay eggs. We have named them fitting names like Milkshake, Banana, Pasta, Chilli and Spongie etc. They are about a week old. We can't wait to have some eggs so let's hope they have a safe journey to the coop.

Echoes of the Tieke

Inspired by the history of the Rangiotu Block, once an impenetrable swamp teeming with native flora and fauna, I have drawn from these plants—mātai, kahikatea, toetoe, harakeke, and mānuka—to create print-like designs that serve as time stamps between the past and present. Small fragments of colour drift on the wind, symbolising the pieces we carry with us or leave behind.

The Tieke - A direct descendant of the majestic huia, the tieke was once abundant across the North Island. Known for its deep connection to weather patterns, its calls were interpreted as signs of shifting winds and impending conditions. In an agricultural community, this relationship between the land and the elements remains powerful. Today, the tieke stands as one of Aotearoa's great conservation success stories-rescued from the brink of extinction, its population continues to grow within protected sanctuaries.

We honour and acknowledge the past, and as future generations continue to flourish, we look ahead as the kaitiaki of this beautiful land.

Manāki whenua, manāki tangata, haere whakamua.

Care for the land, care for the people, go forward.

GO Mini Swimming Sports...


We were fortunate to have a beautiful day to celebrate students' swimming progress, have some healthy house and individual competitions in the water, and show our house spirit.


